## FLUID MASK 3 THE RIGHT TOOL FOR MASKING AND CUT OUTS *Shiv Verma*

*If you have ever wanted to tear your hair out trying to cut hair out from an image then Fluid Mask 3 is your savior.*

VERTUS Tech Fluid Mask 3 is viewed as a professionals' choice in still image cutting. It comes as a stand-alone version as well as a plug-in for Adobe's Photoshop (CS2/CS3) and Elements. It works on Mac (OS.10.3+) and Windows (XP and Vista).

With Fluid Mask 3 you can make incredible mask selections using new sampling and selecting tools. A new complex hair blending algorithm that automatically gets great results even from multi-colored wisps of hair or fur.

The software has a new Patch technology with its intuitive tool-set for working on those difficult problem areas with compression artifacts, poor edges and complex backgrounds. There are a slew of new features such as selecting areas for local detailed edge finding and blending that make masking challenges simple to overcome.

Where Fluid Mask 3 excels is in the creation of cut-outs when the object you're trying to cut out has hair or trees and leaves that have details that interfere with the background like skies and clouds.

I have used two products in the past, one an earlier version of Fluid Mask and the other MaskPro from OnOne Software and realize a vast improvement in this product with the introduction of Version 3. Improvements not only in accuracy but in time too. It now takes less than half the time to create an accurate cutout as compared to all the selection capabilities and new tools in Photoshop CS3

### Photoshop Plug-in or Stand-alone

Even though Fluid Mask 3 comes in two flavors: a Photoshop plug-in and a stand-alone version., my preference is to use the plug-in version as it has no file limitations and works with 16 bit images (the prior version worked only in 8 bit mode).

The user interface is well laid out and for simple images a simple command like the Auto-Fill Image allows you the sit back and watch Fluid Mask generate a near-perfect cut-out.

Fluid Mask's algorithms use image contrast and color differences, similar to the way our eyes see as a basis to determine the edges. Where the software detects adequate contrast between two color areas, the application concludes that it has found an edge. It is these edges that are treated as boundaries for applying a cut-out. This works great except in those images where the contrast becomes too low, particularly where colors of close proximity at the edge make it difficult even for our eyes to differentiate. In these situations a bit of tweaking is necessary. You will have to set the edge detection system to different levels of intelligence, and in most cases you will need to

isolate the difficult part of the image, so Fluid Mask can more easily detect the differences in contrast, hue, and luminance between the areas you're trying to differentiate from each other.

To help the user Fluid Mask 3 has a number of tools. Of significance is the patch tool that allows you to isolate an area and apply different "recognition" settings to that isolated area. The "Patch" tool allows you to make changes affecting a selected localized region without affecting the rest of the image.

"Patches" can be easily selected with a highlighting brush tool rather than relying on a standard box shaped patch. Once a "Patch" has been selected, you can call up the most popular editing options with a simple right click of the mouse.

This Patch tool works in conjunction with the Color Workspace tool that enables you to isolate colors and designate these as good, bad, or undecided.

You use the Color Workspace on an image to sample the colors that you define as the keep colors or that will now belong to the Keep Mask. Fluid Mask provides color and visual aids to help you further identify the keep areas from the reject areas.

The "Color Workspace" palette includes a "Color Sampler" which enables you to select specific colors from an image and see where else within that image the same color appears. Additionally, in the "Color Workspace", a 2-D color map enables more accurate color selection.

Localized "Edge Detection" tools enable the automatic detection of hard to find edges within a Patch. In the same way, localized edge blending techniques are used in Patches to overcome common problems such as masking hair and complex colored foregrounds and backgrounds.

Fluid Mask 3 works with tablets like the Wacom and provides a pressure sensitivity control to regulate brush size.

VERTUS has provided a few good tutorials that will help you get started and the software has a well structured help file. Additionally, Fluid Mask 3 comes with context-based help system accessible on the lower right of the user interface.

This week’s meeting consisted of presentations from three of our members. Dan Bitar discussed some of the basic concepts behind proper exposure. Using slides containing notes and sample images, Dan discussed the importance of proper exposure and ways to deal with images containing both highlight and shadow information which quite often may be beyond the range of both digital and film capture. Much of the discussion centered on the need for proper exposure metering and histogram interpretation.

Michael DiStefano discussed optical filters and how to use them to improve your photos. Using slides containing images both with and without a filter, Michael demonstrated first hand how proper filter usage can enhance a photograph. Also discussed were points such as a rundown of some of the filter manufacturers and the need for good quality when choosing a filter.

Lastly, Pam Medeiros discussed some of the finer points of underwater photography. Pam demonstrated the underwater equipment she uses and some of the techniques and difficulties behind obtaining good underwater images. Pam’s slide show demonstrated a number of beautiful and very colorful images of underwater life.
