

Thanks to everyone for a great year and have a fantastic summer!



Taking a brief break from my National Parks reporting to talk about something that is educational, fun for the family, and a great photo op - re-enactments!

Over the past twenty years, I have enjoyed the “living histories” produced by the men and women representing the Revolutionary War, the Civil War, and World War II. All of these events were no more than ninety minutes from my home. There are similar events all around the country - just do the research.

To get me started, I found the websites for some of the re-enactor groups and where they were “performing.” This helped me to locate larger groups assembling for a potential battle.

War for Independence

Around here, the granddaddy for the American Revolution happens in August at Old Sturbridge Village (OSV). About one thousand men, women and children camp out for the weekend. Their temporary housing is open to the public and you are encouraged to engage with them here. A shorter lens works well in the camps (my

lens of choice: 18-55 mm).

Word to the wise, some of these re-enactors really get into the period with questions about the device you may have over your shoulder or “what’s that in your hands” etc.

OSV’s “**Redcoats and Rebels**” is back after a two-year hiatus due to COVID restrictions. Check your calendars for August 6th and 7th openings. Plan on spending the day! You don’t want to miss the battle. Ask around about where the skirmish will take place and scout out a good location. The

area surrounding the battlegrounds will fill up fast. You'll need a longer lens (my lens of choice: 100 - 400 mm) as you will be kept at a safe distance when the shooting starts. Keep in mind that the cost for their uniforms, their weapons and ammunition are all borne by the participants - it is not an inexpensive hobby. So appreciate all that is happening around you.

Don't forget to pack a snack along with your water even though there are places to grab something. I freeze a bottle of water which stays cold most of the day. There is a general admission fee for OSV. Well worth the price of admission. <https://www.osv.org/event/redcoats-and-rebels-2022/>

The Civil War brought to mind sepia tones while the Revolutionary War had to be in color - if for no other reason than to show off those bright red uniforms of the British. I would think that would have made them easier targets in the field.




